## Creep-Feeding Beef Calves Benefits, Disadvantages

BURG — Creep-feeding in Virginia is a controversial subject, says Curtis, a cattle specialist at Polytechnic Institute. He doubts about the benefit of creep-feeding slaughter

calves, but few cattlemen in the state are in this business. It's a different story with feeder calves. Some cattlemen have had good results with creep-feeding, and others have not. The difference, says Mast, is in the individual situation. For instance, in a field test in Madison County several years ago the pastures were excellent. They had been under a fertilization program for a number of years and the season was good. The cows, for the most part, were good milkers and well bred. The creep-fed calves weighed
